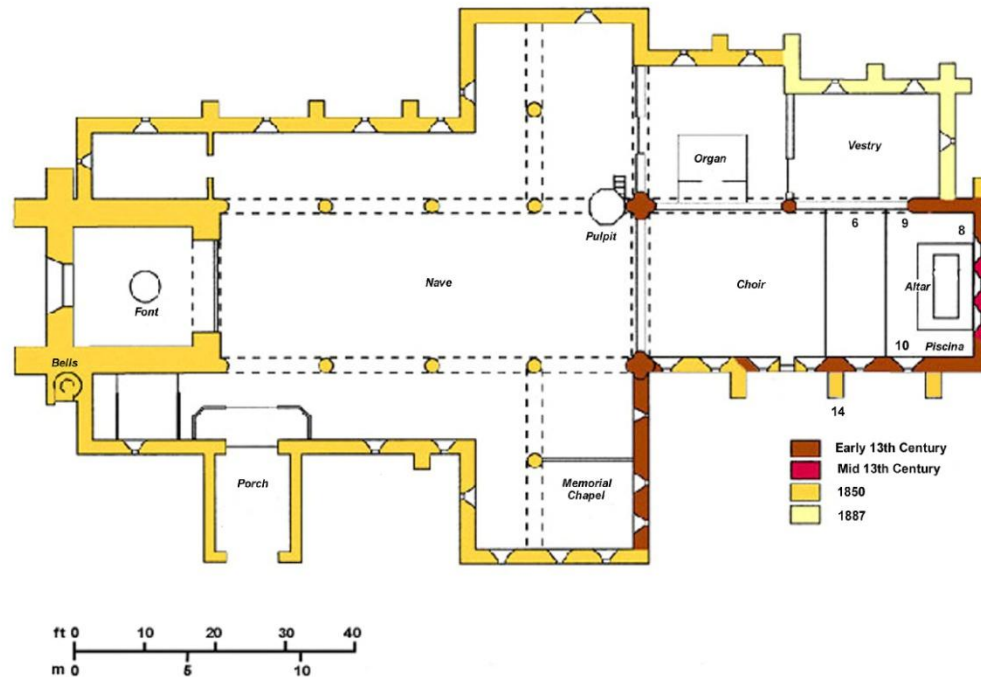

Rest Room:

Bronze Plaque listing the names of those who served in the Boer Wars. 1899 - 1901, a map of the old parish, with a small village map dated 1816 and a drawn record of the Chancel dated 1941.

Baptistry:

Baptismal Font, Basin dated 1664, Pedestal once formed part of an Anglo-Saxon cross from around 800AD, Ornamental font cover 1915, Lord Armstrong's funeral hatchment, 1900, Bell inscribed 'John Thomlinson, Rector of Rothbury 1682'

Flower Vestry: door lintel with the words "Thos Eansley 1611" with carvings of a square and compass, mason's mallet and chisel denoting his trade.

Nave:

The nave was totally restored in 1850 although the nave arch has origins as far back as the thirteenth century. At the rear of the numbered pews nearest at the rear are wooden holders for the silver headed Warden/Beadle staffs.

Pulpit

The pulpit by Ralph Hedley is in memory of Lady Armstrong and the brass eagle lectern was presented in 1887 to commemorate Rector Dr. Ainger

Organ

The organ was given by Lord Armstrong and the Rector, Rev. C.G.V. Harcourt in 1866. It was built by Hill and Sons of London in 1866, and is listed in the National Pipe Organ Register.

Chancel

The oak choir stalls are dedicated to the memory of Edward Mallet Young, Rector of Rothbury, 1894 -1900. The oak screen that divides the chancel from the priest's vestry has twelve panels with the family coats of arms of twelve of the rectors of Rothbury. Close to the Altar is a thirteenth century Piscina and to the right is a priest's door.

Memorial Chapel

Dedicated to the memory of the men of Rothbury who died in both World Wars. The Book of Remembrance was the gift of the British Legion and the women's section.

Services

The Parish

The former Parish of Rothbury was extensive, stretching from Hepple in the west to Pauperhaugh in the east and from Trew hitt in the north to beyond Simonside in the south. There is a small church in both Hepple: Christ Church and Thropton: St Andrews

In 2004 the new parish of Upper Coquetdale was created, combining the Rothbury parish those of Alwinton, Holystone and Alnham. This formed a parish of approximately 180 square miles and with six churches. One interesting point is the area of Kidland in the north west of the parish. Until the late 20 century this did not belong to any parish: it was termed "ex parochial", having once being given to the monks of Newminster. The same ex-parochial status was held (amongst others) by Brinkburn Priory and the Farne Islands. Until the time that Kidland was combined with the parish of Alwinton and Holystone, the vicar of Alwinton also carried the majestic title of Lord of Kidland. The population of the parish of Upper Coquetdale is approximately 4,500.

There are six churches in the parish. All are open, all day, and every day from dawn to dusk. They are all there to welcome you.
